RESOLUTION # 10-19-94-A

- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is a federally recognized Indian government and a treaty tribe recognized by the laws of the United States, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida General Tribal Council is the governing body of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Business Committee has been delegated the authority of Article IV, Section 1 of the Oneida Tribe Constitution by the Oneida General Council, and
- WHEREAS, the goal of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin is to protect, maintain and improve the standard of living and the environment in which the Oneida people live; while maintaining and re-establishing the sovereign rights of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS, under the Constitution and By-Laws of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, the Oneida Business Committee is charged with the duty of protecting and enhancing the health, security, and general welfare and advancement of the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin, and
- WHEREAS, Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) Legislation has made additional funding available for communities to meet their transportation needs including performing a road inventory for all Indian Nations through contractual arrangements made between the Bureau of Indians Affairs and a regional consultant, Martell and Associates of Kansas City, Kansas, and
- WHEREAS, the Oneida Tribe of Indians of Wisconsin requires a more substantial inventory because of it's significant interest in ALL roads within the reservation boundaries, and
- WHEREAS, performing this more demanding task requires the Bureau of Indian Affairs to modify its contract with the regional consultant to include additional time and resources necessary to perform a satisfactory road inventory.
