Susan White is the Director of the Trust and Enrollment Department, a role she has served for nearly 20 years. Her responsibilities include daily management and supervision of an Oneida department that has some of the most critical operations in regard to Oneida Tribal Trust funds and official membership rolls. Susan is responsible to maintain the integrity and confidentiality of some of Oneida's greatest assets.

For more than two decades Susan White has been a strong influence and leader for the Oneida Trust Enrollment Committee and department to safeguard and manage the assets. She's been a staunch advocate for Socially Responsible Investing and she has promoted this philosophy throughout the country. Below is an excerpt taken from the First Nations

Susan's work in shareholder advocacy has granted her and the Oneida Trust Enrollment Committee the Harvard Honoring Nations American Indian

Economic Development Award in 2010 for advocacy through investment holdings, the SRI Service Award in 2011, and recognition as a speaker at Native American Finance and National Aboriginal

Trust Officers Association conferences and the SRI Conference.

Susan started her career in the financial industry in 1987, and began working for the Oneida Nation in 1994.

With the advent of Indian gaming, Susan built the Trust Enrollment Department to be a pivotal function in the Oneida Nation's infrastructure by developing the trust funds as an endowment vehicle to fund scholarship programs, other departments, and a nationwide life insurance policy for all Oneida citizens.

Aside from her career, Susan is also active serving as co-chair for the Investors and Indigenous Peoples Working Group, the First Nations Development Institute Board of Directors, the Women's Fund of Greater Green Bay Emeritus, the Oneida Auxiliary VFW Post 7784, a Trustee for the Episcopal Diocese of Fond Du Lac, and the American Foundation for Counseling Services Ethics in Business Selection Committee. Oneida Spirit Canoe Project 2018

-- Oneida, Wisconsin

The Woodland Indian Art, Inc., a 501c3, non-profit organization, will be hosting a traditional birch bark canoe construction and demonstration project commencing on May 7, 2018.

Entitled the ONEIDA SPIRIT CANOE (hereafter canoe), the project will take approximately 21 days (construction time) and the canoe is proposed to be launched on the Oneida Lake on or about May 29, 2018. Completion of the canoe with decorative external bark carvings will take place as a demonstration at the 12th Annual Woodland Indian Art Show and Market at the Oneida Radisson Hotel and Conference Center on June 1-3, 2018.

Construction of the canoe will take place at the Oneida Food Pantry, located at N7360 Water Circle Place in Oneida. The Oneida Food Pantry is directly behind the Oneida Post Office and in the Little Bear Industrial Park (look for the Oneida Water Tower) on State Highway 54.

The intent of the canoe project is to provide cultural and art learning opportunities for the Oneida community, surrounding other tribal communities and the general public. The event is OPEN TO THE PUBLIC, IS FREE and everyone is welcomed and encouraged to participate in the construction, monitoring and learning, as each component of the development of the canoe will be accompanied with the cultural relevance of each step, the use of natural products and the historical significance.

The ONEIDA SPIRIT CANOE project will be directed by Josy Thomas (Onondaga) and two Aboriginal art apprentices who have worked with him for over three years. Josy is the grandson of Chief Jacob Thomas who raised him and taught him all of the traditional knowledge and skills he carries today as a member of the False Face Society and a Faith Keeper. Josy has built over 75 birch bark canoes, two of which are in the permanent collection of the Canoe Museum in Peterborough, Ontario, Canada.

An EDGE OF THE WOODS CEREMONY will be held at the construction site beginning at 8:00 AM on Monday, May 7th and the project will become operational immediately after the ceremony. Set up and preparation of the site will begin on Monday, May 7, 2018 and the construction will run through Tuesday, May 29, 2018 between the weekday hours of 8:00 AM through 5:00 PM. No work will be done on Friday, May 25th through Monday, May 28th due to the Oneida Code Talkers Day (May 25th) and Memorial Day (May 28th) holidays.

Once a week everyone is welcome to participate in an evening celebration of the progress and join the staff in a meal and social song and dance. The dates are Tuesday, May 15th, Tuesday, May 22nd and Tuesday, May 29th (launching party). The May 15th and 22nd events will take place at the construction site and the 29th event will take place at Oneida Lake. All evening events will begin at 6:00 PM.

HEARTH Act strengthens Oneida Nation's sovereignty

Oneida, Wisc. ~ The Oneida Nation previously received official notification from the Deputy Assistant Secretary for the Bureau of Indian Affairs, that he has approved Oneida Nation land leasing codes. Oneida Nation Chairman, Tehassi Hill said, "This is wonderful news and will now allow our government to move forward with the development of

our leasing procedures in a pro-active and responsible manner. This approval will strengthen the Oneida Nation's ability to exercise jurisdiction and control to promote responsible economic and social growth on Oneida Nation lands. Although the order was signed in early April, it did not become official until it was published in the National Register."

The vision of the Oneida Nation is strong families built on Tsi?niyuk-walihot^ and a strong economy and this leads to the mission to strengthen and protect Oneida people, resources and recover reservation land. Another component to responsible development by the nation has been the enhancement of the environment by exercising Oneida Nation's sov-

ereignty through Oneida Laws and Regulations.

This approval is part of the Department of Interior's plan under the Helping Expedite and Advance Responsible Tribal Homeownership (HEARTH) Act. Chairman Hill explains, "This means the Oneida Nation's authority to enact and implement our own tribal regulations which promote our self-determination and sovereignty. Oneida will have the ability to lease Oneida Nation trust lands or our restricted land by implementing leasing regulations that specifically meet our needs and we

can do this in a more efficient and expeditious manner, we no longer have to wait for years to have the BIA approve."

This is another milestone for the Oneida Nation exercising sovereignty with a far reaching impact. In 2015, the Oneida held the first successful Secretarial Election in nearly 50 years to amend the Oneida Constitution. This is significant prog-



ress since Federal Policy in the 1930's when the federal government sought to curb Tribes exercising their sovereignty by breaking up reservation lands into allotments and re-organizing Tribal governments. The Oneida Nation is exercising self-governance more now and doing so in a responsible manner. This approval will expedite the Oneida Nation's leasing process without having to wait years for federal approval.

Increasing self-governance has long been a goal for the Oneida Nation. This notification expands their ability to govern their own lands within the reservation.

The Oneida Nation has successfully re-acquired and responsibly developed the Oneida Reservation aggressively for the past several decades.

The Ho Chunk Nation is the other Wisconsin based nation that has received this designation.

Wisconsin man charged in uncle's fatal shooting in Minnesota

CARLTON, Minn. (AP) ~ A Wisconsin man is charged with fatally shooting his uncle in northeastern Minnesota.

Thirty-two-year-old James Montano of Bayfield, Wisconsin, was charged Tuesday with second-degree murder, attempted first-degree murder and second-degree assault. Bail was set

at \$500,000.

Montano is accused of shooting his uncle, 57-year-old Andrew Gokee, of Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin, in the head last Friday night at his father's home in the Carlton County community of Progress. He later died at a hospital.

Montano also is accused of shooting at his

cousin, who was grazed by a bullet. According to the complaint, the cousin later fired at Montano, who was found in a field with a non-life-threatening gunshot wound to his chest.

Gokee was the former director of the Native American Center at the University of Wisconsin-Steven Point.

Senate votes to nullify Minnesota wild rice water standard

The Minnesota Senate voted 38-28 Monday to nullify a water quality standard that's meant to protect wild rice, a food central to the culture and diet of the region's Ojibwe Indians.

But senators also voted to add \$500,000 for restoration work to the bill, which passed the House 78-45 last week, so the legislation will have to go back to the House before it goes to Gov. Mark Dayton. The governor has not publicly said whether he'll sign or veto the measure. His spokesman, Sam Fetting, said Dayton was still reviewing the bill.

A 1973 state law that went unenforced until recently, when the debate over mining in northeastern Minnesota heated up, limits sulfate discharges into waters where wild rice

grows to 10 milligrams per liter. Sponsors of the legislation said the standard is based on outdated science from the 1940s and that it would cost mining companies and municipal wastewater treatment plants hundreds of millions of dollars to comply.

Tribal and environmental groups support preserving the standard, saying recent scientific research backs up the need to protect wild rice from excessive sulfate levels that can stunt its growth.

Sen. David Tomassoni, a Chisholm Democrat, said wild rice is thriving, with a bumper crop last year, even though the standard isn't being enforced.

"I'm not willing to risk one job because of an outdated standard, and nobody can tell me it will make a difference in the growth of wild rice," he said during the debate.

Late last week, the Min-

nesota Pollution Control Agency shelved an effort mandated by the 2011 Legislature to update the standard. The agency proposed replacing it with a complex mathematical formula tailored to the chemistry of specific lakes and streams, an approach opposed by both sides. The agency gave up after the state's chief administrative law judge, Tammy Pust, rejected the plan for a second time. Pust ruled in January that the proposal violates federal and state law and puts an unfair burden on Native Americans who harvest wild rice for food. Earlier this month, she said the MPCA's revisions fell short of curing

the plan's defects.

The bill's lead sponsor, Sen. Justin Eichorn, a Grand Rapids Republican, said the legislation would put a stop to all that and give all sides a chance to go back to the drawing board.

Two scientists who helped lead the research behind the MPCA's proposal urged lawmakers not to repeal the existing standard, saying their worked confirmed that it remains scientifically valid. Amy Myrbo of the University of Minnesota and Daniel Engstrom, director emeritus of the St. Croix Watershed Research Station, said in letters to lawmakers that the peer-reviewed

studies unambiguously showed the need for either the current standard or the MPCA's proposal. They noted that the research also found that allowing higher sulfate levels could lead to more mercury in the fish Minnesotans catch and eat.

"Don't say the science is bad because you don't like the impact of what the science might be," Sen. John Marty, a Roseville Democrat, told his fellow senators.

MPCA Commissioner John Linc Stine told lawmakers in a letter that under the federal Clean Water Act, the state can't change the standard without replacing it with something that is equally or more

protective. Doing so could lead to costly litigation, he warned. Stine also said his agency has a record of issuing variances to ease the burdens on communities when water treatment costs are prohibitive.

Paula Maccabee, an attorney for WaterLegacy, said her group and Friends of the Boundary Waters Wilderness collected cards signed by over 700 citizens last weekend asking Dayton to veto the bill, and they planned to present them to the governor's office on Monday.

"It takes a lot of courage to stand up to the special interests, and that's what we need from our government," Maccabee said.

Your voice is extremely important as we implement a 3 year planning cycle. The overall message, to operations, for planning each fiscal year is to continue working towards sustainability, be conservative by focusing on efficiencies to better meet the needs of the people.

Coming in to my new role on the Business Committee, I learned that over the past few decades the Oneida Nation has continually sought to reorganize our government structure. I wanted to begin to share information on some of the things I learned about the history of the Oneida Nation's government and why I feel that it is vital that we change our governmental structure.

I have been reminded by my elders that we should never forget where we have come from and that

decisions we make should be in the best interest of our future generations. Over the years, I have taken the time to learn more about our Oneida government's history, our culture and our belief system. I have realized that our stories like the Creation story, Handsome lake, the Great Law, etc. have portrayed a sense of change that have led to our Nation's survival and legacy. Throughout our history, we have been forced to change with the times and experienced events that shaped

our government today. It is now that I lean on those historical struggles and recognize the changes our ancestors made to contribute to our growth and successes. Once again, we are at a time whereby we have recognized for the need for change. The Nation's leadership and people have been working toward reorganization of the Nation's governmental structure for years. With the recent changes to our Nation's Constitution, it opened the gateway to develop a government

structure that will match the culture of our people.

Our Oneida Creation story told in full, reminds us about what balance means and also that we are all connected to one another and to all of creation. We were all given responsibilities that we are to uphold. One responsibility the Ukwehuwe (the original human being) has is to express our thankfulness to all of creation each and every day. As time went on, the People of the Longhouse, Haudenosaunee, developed ways of

being a nation of people. The Great Law of Peace was eventually adopted by the original five Nations and they united together in peace, becoming the Iroquois Confederacy. Through the Great Law of Peace a governing system was created and Clan Mothers, Chiefs and Faith Keepers were named. The Clan System also became an important part of the way the Haudenosaunee

functioned as a large society. Each of the clans was given responsibilities. The Turtle Clan represents the shifting of the earth and moon cycles and the people of the Turtle clan are considered the wealth of information and keepers of the land and environment. The Bear Clan is known as the keepers of the medicines. The Wolf Clan represents the path finders. Their responsibility is to guide the people in living their lives the way the Creator intended. This is a very short explanation of what our traditional form of government was and as it still exists to this day.

Reorganization of the government came with the Indian Reorganization Act (IRA) of 1934. It provided the foundation for drafting and adopting the Oneida Constitution two years later, which transformed the Tribal government to an elected system with four members serving on a Tribal Council. This decision, however, was always questioned by the membership because a true majority of Tribal members did not participate in the vote. Traditionalists who opposed, their voices were not heard. Ultimately, however, the Oneida IRA Charter was approved by the Tribe in 1937, and 1,270 acres of land were bought back by the government and placed in trust for the Oneida Nation.

Since that time, the Oneida Nation's

constitution had been amended a few times to create the government we have today. In my opinion, our Nation has been operating with a government that had been forced upon us and is unnatural to our way of being. Our current form of government has also proven overtime to be inefficient, and limiting. If we want a different end result for ourselves as a nation then we have to change the very structure of how we function and operate. And that starts with our form of government. We can no longer complain about our government without providing solutions and without being willing to change. The time for change is now. We cannot put off for tomorrow what should be done today. We cannot leave it up to the

next generation to make the changes that need to happen. We need to make those necessary changes and prepare the next generation by giving them a stronger form of government that they can build on.

As we come together to make a decision for our future, it is my hope that we recognize where we have come from, and yet also know where we want our Nation to be in the future. I look forward to our future discussions on the issue of "Reorganization" and our ability to rebuild our Nation's architecture to one that builds upon our sovereign strength.

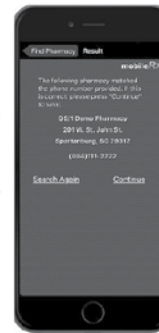

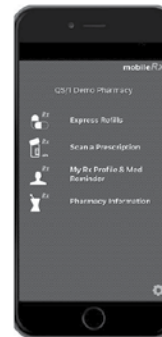

To use mobileRx, you must find your pharmacy. When the **Select Pharmacy** pop-up displays, tap **Find Pharmacy**, and enter the phone number (9208694970). Tap **Search**.



HOME SCREEN

The home screen will then display options for requesting refills. Choose **Express Refills** to enter the prescription numbers or tap **Scan a Prescription** to scan the barcode on your current prescription label.



EXPRESS REFILLS

Express Prescription Refills allows you to enter up to three prescription numbers to be refilled at a time. To request more than three refills, repeat the process. Then, tap **Send**.

Watch Out for Fake AT&T Customer Service Calls

MADISON ~ The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) has received a number of recent contacts from Wisconsin consumers about a robocall imposter scam that claims to come from AT&T.

The calls have been spoofed to show AT&T's actual customer service phone number on recipients' caller ID displays. The automated message in the calls warns recipients of an issue with their internet service related to a security breach. Call recipients are asked to press a button in order to speak

to a representative about the situation.

Regardless of what your caller ID says, these calls are not from AT&T and are not legitimate. If you receive a similar call, hang up immediately and do not press any buttons. If you do press a button to speak with a "representative," your number will likely be added to a future call list and you may be pressed for money or personal information from a scammer.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding your AT&T service, contact the company directly by using the con-

tact information listed on your monthly billing statement.

Bureau of Indian Affairs director resigns after 6 months

WASHINGTON (AP) – The director of the federal Bureau of Indian Affairs has resigned after six months on the job.

Bryan Rice, a veteran federal administrator and citizen of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma, resigned earlier this week, a BIA spokeswoman said Friday. Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke named Rice to the post in October.

BIA spokeswoman Nedra Darling did not offer a reason why Rice resigned and declined further comment.

Darryl LaCounte, director of the agency's

Rocky Mountain Region, will serve as acting BIA director, Darling said.

LaCounte, who is based in Billings, Mont., is an experienced leader who will "maintain a smooth transition" for BIA employees and tribal nations, Darling said.

The BIA coordinates government-government relations with 567 federally recognized tribes in the United States.

Rice previously led Interior's Office of Wildland Fire and also has worked for the U.S. Forest Service, an Agriculture Department agency.

Your Friend is Not Pitching Grant Scams on Facebook

MADISON - Wisconsin consumers are reporting a grant scam that uses Facebook Messenger to transmit phony pitches for free money. Messages look like they are coming from friends, but they are not.

The messages state that the consumer's name appeared on a list as being eligible to receive grant money, and that the consumer will receive thousands of dollars in grant funds after paying a fee. The consumer is encouraged to contact a company via an email address or phone number that is provided.

One Wisconsin consumer reported that a trusted friend (actually an imposter) reached out via Messenger to find out if she had received a payout from the "Department of Human Service Grant Program fund." The "friend" said that she was on the list of randomly selected names to receive money from the fund and that she was eligible for \$50,000 in cash after paying a delivery and tax clearance fee.

None of the consumers that reported this scam to DATCP have fallen vic-

tim.

Tips to avoid grant scams include:

- Promises of free grant money are common scams. Consumers who receive contacts about free money should delete the message and not respond.
- Remember that you should never pay money to win a prize or to receive "free" grant money.
- The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) does offer grants to social service programs, but not to individuals.
- It is illegal to ask someone to pay to apply for a federal grant or to increase their odds of being awarded a grant.

Wisconsin Democrats blast federal food stamps work proposal

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Wisconsin Democrats blasted a federal proposal Tuesday that would impose new work and job training requirements for food stamps Tuesday, pointing to a new analysis that shows the measure could force nearly 76,000 state residents out of the program.

Senate Minority Leader Jennifer Shilling and state Rep. Lisa Subeck called a news conference to release a report from the nonpartisan Legislative Fiscal Bureau on the GOP-authored bill.

According to the report, the bill would prohibit anyone who doesn't receive federal cash assistance or receive services for the needy funded with federal grants from participating in the Supplemental Nutrition Assis-

tance Program, or SNAP. The program provides food aid for more than 40 million people.

According to the LFB analysis, 11.1 percent of Wisconsin food stamp recipients would likely lose their eligibility under the bill. That would translate to 75,720 of 682,924 recipients.

About 23,370 children would likely lose food stamp eligibility and with it lose automatic eligibility for free and reduced school lunches, the analysis found. The children's parents would have to re-apply separately for free and reduced lunches.

Wisconsin as a whole would lose about \$23.8 million in food stamp benefits, the analysis found. The state received about \$867.2 million in food stamp benefits last year.

Shilling and Subeck

said at the news conference Republicans are trying to find ways to offset revenue lost due to the federal tax overhaul on the backs of hungry children.

"It's bad enough Republicans fought to give millionaires another tax break," Shilling said in a news release she handed out to reporters at the news conference. "But then to turn around and deny low-income children access to food? It's unthinkable. How can Republican politicians justify these horribly misplaced priorities that favor the wealthy at the expense of vulnerable children?"

The bill cleared the GOP-run House Agriculture Committee last month despite Democrats' charges that it would remove up to 2 million people from food

stamp rolls.

Republican Rep. Mike Conaway of Texas is the bill's lead author. His spokeswoman, Emily Hytha, referred questions to Rachel Millard, a spokeswoman for the Agriculture Committee.

Millard called the Democrats' complaints "scare tactics." She said anyone who loses eligibility because they don't receive federal assistance could reapply for food stamps by meeting other standards, such as an asset test.

"The reality is when you get into the fine print of our bill, this is really about providing services to those in greatest need," Millard said.

- Must submit to drug testing prior to appointment and on an annual basis.
- Must not be an employee of the Oneida Police Department.
- Shall attend applicable training.
- Must be a person of known good standing in the community.

WHAT IS AN ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY?

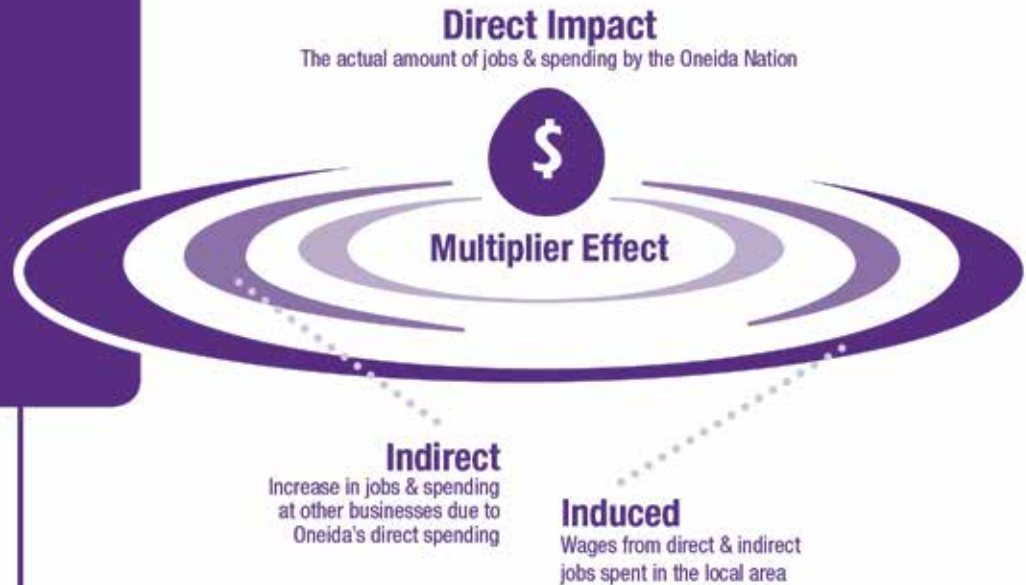
It is a study that details the positive impacts of jobs and spending that one entity has on an entire region.

Howah, that was a wicked winter! Even by Wisconsin standards, that one was pretty darn wicked! Otse!

If you're anything like me, the call to go outside and enjoy the nicer weather has never been greater. The best thing about Wisconsin is there is no shortage of things to do outside, you just have to get outside and do them.

Hiking wasn't always on top of my list of great outdoor activities. It was something I had done be-

fore but it wasn't always something I looked forward to doing with my free time. Yet, like many adults, I felt stuck. I felt like my love of traveling and entertainment was so expensive and not something I could do every time I needed a break from reality. I could never really go to all the places I wanted to because it just cost too much to keep up with my desire for change. My daily life of work, family, and responsibility had me consumed and getting that feeling of freedom just seemed so far out of reach.

It wasn't until I was

discussing these disconnected and lost feelings with Annette Cornelius, a Traditional Wellness Counselor here in our community, that I began to fully understand the benefits of how just by being outdoors more could have on my mind, body, and spirit. She began to discuss what I want to call, "Environmental Connection," and some of the science behind this form of healing. Up until this discussion I had with Annette, I hadn't heard anyone really discuss science and spirituality in the same conversation before. Naively, I always pictured the two as separate. One of her suggestions as to how to reconnect these portions of myself was to go outside in nature. Nature would begin to heal me in ways that I could not myself.

I decided to just listen to this advice and find ways to venture out. As fate would have it, I soon went on a date to a local county park called Fonferek's Glen, which is part of Brown County Parks system. I never heard of this park before. Yet, this was not odd to me because I was so caught up in traveling outside of Wisconsin, I really didn't know Wisconsin all that well.

Lost city in Kansas open for tours

ARKANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP) ~ Limited tours of a lost city are being offered in south-central Kansas.

Donald Blakeslee is an anthropologist and archaeologist at Wichita State University. He announced last year that he had solved a 400-year-old mystery and found the lost city of Etzanao, The Wichita Eagle reported. The city is located city about 50 miles (80 kilometers) southeast of Wichita.

It will take years for the preservation and development of Etzanao to be ready for visitors year-round. But for now,

Arkansas City historians and leaders are letting the public see some glimpses of what and where the mysterious city once was.

Tours can be arranged through the Cherokee Strip Land Rush Museum, which also offers a documentary on the discovery.

"We take people to three or four of the major contributing sites across town," said Sandy Randal, Cherokee Strip Land Rush Museum director and coordinator of activities for Etzanao.

The tours are of the remnants of Etzanao, located on the bluffs near the confluence of the

Walnut and Arkansas rivers.

Blakeslee will be leading a monthlong archaeological dig in June along the bluffs and bottomland in search of more artifacts.

Historians believe it was home to 20,000 people between the years 1450 and 1700. The Etzanaos are ancestors of the Wichita tribe, who were farmers and cultivated beans, maize, pumpkin and squash and slaughtered bison.

This spring many changes are going on at the Tsyunhékwá Farm. The biggest is a move from Internal Services to Environmental Health Safety and Land Division's (EHSLD) Eco Services Department. This is an interim assignment until an Agricultural Strategy is completed by the Oneida Sustainable Resource Agriculture Council (OSRAC). The farm site supervisor trainee was posted, and we will begin the selection process as soon as the new Personnel Selec-

tion Committee is up and running. The Cannery remains under Internal Services Division at this time.

We have been very busy getting ready for the Seed & Plant Distribution, rescheduled to May 20 due to a GTC Special meeting being scheduled for the original date of May 12. Seeds have been planted and many of EHSLD Division's staff have graciously volunteered their time in the last couple weeks to assist the two farm staff with transplanting. In past years the farm has distributed to 200 families. We will have 9 seeds and 4 plant

varieties available for purchase for \$10. There is also a raised garden bed workshop free on the day of the event. Farmer market vendors will be available for food sales.

Another change at the farm is a community supported garden program being run by the Cannery as part of a grant with Cultural Heritage. Any community member can volunteer in the garden in exchange for a share of the garden harvest this summer and fall. They hope to teach community members how to grow

GTC Are YOU going to allow the ONEIDA BUSINESS COMMITTEE to violate the laws created by ONEIDA GENERAL TRIBAL COUNCIL to DISSOLVE THE ONEIDA PERSONNEL COMMISSION?

- On April 11, 2018, the OBC passed 2 Resolutions, 4-11-18-A, dissolved the Personnel Commission; 4-11-19-B, renamed the Personnel Commission as the "Personnel Selection Committee." The said resolutions state that the OBC has utilized "emergency" actions to implement these resolutions.

However, the OBC has not clearly mentioned any real emergency. The OBC references "budget issues" however the Personnel Commission has not overspent their budget in 18 years.

The OBC does not have the authority to overrule the laws created and approved by GTC. This authority lies ONLY with GTC. Requiring a 2/3 majority vote.

- The OBC took away the process and procedures that are provided in the Blue Book that afford employees the right to appeal employment actions and require the Personnel Commission have oversight in the hiring process.

The OBC's actions have caused chaos because they took these actions without having a process in place. This has caused harm to employees in the appeal and hiring process.

- The OBC has colluded with the Judiciary who has agreed to take on the grievance cases which are on the Personnel Commission's docket.

The OBC has muddied the waters and directly VIOLATED the SEPARATION OF POWERS as contained in the Oneida Constitution. The OBC is the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch (LOC) and they have colluded with the Judiciary Branch. This creates a conflict of interest for the Judiciary which leaves no SEPARATION OF POWER (BC Resolution 4-11-18-A, 8th whereas).

- The OBC's actions have caused the following:

1. Employee Grievances:

The OBC is a Respondent in several cases pending before the Personnel Commission. The OBC as a Respondent dissolved the Personnel Commission. How can the OBC as a Respondent dissolve the Personnel Commission while their cases are being heard? This is not only a conflict of interest; the OBC has violated the Code of Ethics, the Oneida Constitution, their Oath's of Office, and the Blue Book. All active cases before the Personnel Commission have been placed on HOLD by the actions of the OBC. The OBC is relying upon themselves as a subcommittee of the LOC to create laws after they have already disregarded laws put in place by the GTC.

JUSTICE DELAYED IS JUSTICE DENIED

2. Hiring Process:

The HRD Manager has unlimited authority in the hiring process with absolutely no checks or balances. This means they can hire who they want, however they want without oversight. The Personnel Commission has been tasked by GTC to provide the Oversight, to have the best interest of the Oneida Nation at heart. This has been completely eliminated by the OBC.

3. The Ultimate Authority of GTC

The OBC has acted in a manner that would suggest they have more authority than GTC. This is abuse of power. The OBC has taken action to dissolve the Personnel Commission, created by GTC, in the Blue Book. The only lawful authority to dissolve the Personnel Commission is GTC, requiring a 2/3 majority vote. Is GTC willing to allow the OBC to disregard the authority of GTC? Any entity created by GTC can be next on the agenda of the OBC for dissolution. The actions of the OBC are clearly paving the way for their proposed Employment Law, which GTC has not seen/approved.

Here's Why You Should Send Your Kids to Camp

The snow has melted, the breeze is warm, and the sun has finally come out of hiding. That can only mean it's Spring. Soon enough Spring will give away to summer, and kids will break free from the classroom and jump headfirst into summer vacation. Keeping kids busy when they suddenly have all that free time on their hands can be a challenge for caregivers who have plenty on their plate. Enter the summer camp.

Many of us have fond memories of summer camp. Some of us attended overnight camps where you packed a bag or two and hung out with friends for a few weeks snuggled under blankets in a cabin. Some of us attended day camps where we ate brown bag lunches and went home at the end of the day awaiting our next day's adventures. Whatever the camp, they were usually a lot of fun.

Fun isn't the only great thing about camp. Kids can get a lot out of attending even a day camp. The American Camp Association (ACA) stresses the psychological benefits of camp saying that, "The camp experience is recognized by child de-

velopment professionals as valuable in helping children mature socially, emotionally, intellectually, morally, and physically."¹ The ACA goes on to say that, "[Children] learn to work together, make choices, take responsibility, develop creative skills, build independence and self-reliance, and gain confidence."²

Todd Kestin, writing for the Huffington Post, asserts that attending day camp can even help prepare children for the responsibilities of adulthood. He writes that, "At camp, kids learn teamwork...the camp environment teaches resilience... kids learn to make decisions at camp...camp sets a kid up for trying new things...[and helps] your child to grow up."³ Many children come away from camp with new friends, new skills, and new or increased feelings of independence and confidence.

What about the cost of camp? According to Care.com, the average day camp cost is \$304 per week but can range from \$100 to over \$500 a week.⁴ For many caregivers, the cost can be prohibitive. Fortunately, there are less expensive options. For example, the Oneida Communi-

ty Education Center and the Oneida Arts Program have low cost, week long, day camps available this summer for \$30 a child (\$10 if you qualify for a scholarship). Check out oneidacommunityeducationcenter.org for more details, and think about giving your children or grandchildren the opportunity to reap all of the benefits of summer camp.

Wisconsin biologist hopes to study mussels in Green Bay

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Pollutants such as phosphorous and polychlorinated biphenyls are contributing to the decimation of freshwater mussel populations in areas like the Bay of Green Bay and the Lower Fox River.

Invasive species, like zebra and quagga mussels, are also competing against native mussels and driving down populations, Wisconsin Public Radio reported.

Of the 51 species of freshwater mussels in Wisconsin, 24 are either endangered, threatened or of special concern, said Jesse Weinzinger is a conservation biologist with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

“Freshwater mussels are considered the most imperiled animal group in the world, over 70 percent of them are in decline,” he said.

Weinzinger is hoping to secure a grant from the department’s Office of Great Waters to conduct a survey on the types and numbers of mussels in Green Bay and the Lower Fox River. Biologists are lacking knowledge about what mussels are in the water, he said.

“We want to find out what kind of habitats (the mussels) are currently occupying,” Weinzinger said.

The department is currently studying mussels in the Wolf River and the Wis-

consin River with the help of the Wisconsin Mussel Monitoring program. The program encourages people to get involved in mussel conservation by take taking of mussels they see in the wild and submitting them with descriptions to a website.

“Volunteers in past inventory surveys have cataloged seven species in Green Bay but we don’t know how many, we don’t know the densities and we don’t know exactly where they occur,” Weinzinger said.

Weinzinger hopes to begin the survey this summer if he gets department approval.

How Native American powwows evolved over years

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — The Gathering of Nations, one of the world's largest gatherings of indigenous people, started Friday in Albuquerque. The annual event attracts about 3,000 dancers from hundreds of tribes from the U.S., Canada and Mexico and draws about 80,000 visitors who come to see dances, drum contests and competitions.

The Native American event is a powwow — a pan-American Indian celebration featuring song, dance and prayer. They are held in stadiums, rural community centers, high school gyms or outdoor arenas, and offer an opportunity for American Indians from different tribal nations with diverse histories to come together to reaffirm their shared experiences and reunite with friends.

Here's a look at how powwows began and have evolved over the years:

History of the Powwow

Native American tribes for centuries come together for ceremonies and communal feasts, inviting outsiders and other tribal communities to take part. The term "powwow" comes from the Algonquin word "pau-wau" referring to a gathering of spiritual leaders.

According to "Powwow," a 2006 anthology of scholarly essays about the event, modern powwow culture first appeared in the 1930s and maintained ties to specific tribal and communities practices.

Federal government officials established policies prohibiting traditional dances and public religious practices starting in the late 1800s. They remained in place until the 1930s, when a new powwow culture emerged.

It soon became an important element of the post-World War II pan-Indian movement and quickly transformed into one of the most popular expressions of ethnic awareness in Indian Country, especially among tribes in the Plains.

Uniting Event

Today, many powwows follow similar templates, with local customs shaping dances and contests during the events. The gatherings usually begin with a prayer and a formal opening led by military veterans and dancers from various tribes in a display of Native American unity.

Dancers wearing intricate, colorful regalia compete in different categories and age groups, and performers take part in singing contests before a panel of judges.

Tribal artists display their work and Native

American hip-hop groups sell CDs. In urban areas, the gatherings also provide an opportunity for Native Americans to network and build new friendships.

Gathering of Nations

The Gathering of Nations began in 1983 in a gym at present-day St. Pius X High School in Albuquerque and moved to Expo New Mexico soon after. The event relocated to the University of New Mexico and is now held at the Expo New Mexico fairground.

Over the years, it morphed into one of North America's most popular powwows and has been showcased in popular culture ranging from literature to movies. A character in the 1998 movie "Smoke Signals," for example, said the Gathering of Nations was such a powerful pan-Indian event that it would have kept Columbus away if it had existed in 1492.

It's not the only large powwow. Others include the Denver March in Colorado in March, Red Earth in Oklahoma City in June and Crow Fair in Montana in August.

area and it was gorgeous and all, but I saw the high cliffs and terrain and just wanted to climb and get a good sweat going. You know, get the blood going? The waterfall seemed picture worthy and all but I hadn't yet gotten up close and personal with it. I just wanted to get climbing because that is all I knew at that time!

Because I had so much fun, I went back with my date within the same week and we decided to get closer to the waterfall. and harvest indigenous foods and wild foods, how to preserve and prepare those foods, education on nutrition and health benefits and provide relevant cultural teachings. To join please contact Jamie Better at the Oneida Cannery at (920) 869-2214. Garden tilling services are continuing, call by May 15 to get on the list and payment must be received before services will be completed. Call Kyle Wisneski at (920) 869-2718 for more information and to sign up for tilling services.

Moving on to animal management, the chickens will be harvested soon and they will be used for booyah served at Harvest Days. The current chicken coop will be

razed due to age and condition and we are looking into a chicken "tractor" movable system that would follow the cattle and fertilize the soil. This has been done at Forest County Potawatomi Nation and we will be scheduling a field trip to visit and learn more. The herd is doing well and we will be looking to harvest this summer. Watch for more information to be advertised soon for pricing and purchase. We did have a cow with a medical physical injury that we had to call the vet in for on Friday April 20. The vet assured us the condition of the cow would worsen but the meat was still good. She was taken in for harvest on Tuesday April 24 and

the meat will be donated to Oneida Community Pantry and Oneida non-profit community groups such as WIVA and VFW.

We have a rotational grazing plan in place for the cattle. As always our main focus remains the white corn and everything else we do is to support the white corn. White corn is in a crop rotation that follows three years of cattle grazing and one year of white corn planting. We are looking at ways to increase yield in coming years to meet the community demand.

We have many workshops planned this summer including three sisters planting workshop, bergamot and sweet grass harvest days. That's your spring update from the

Tsyunhéhkwá Farm and we look forward to seeing the community out at the site for our many educational events!

Study: Wisconsin tribal forests more diverse, sustainable

MADISON, Wis. (AP) ~ Native American reservations in northern Wisconsin have older trees, as well as better plant diversity and tree regeneration than surrounding state or national forests, according to researchers.

Dartmouth College and University of Wisconsin-Madison researchers recently published their findings in an issue of the Ecology and Society journal, Wisconsin Public Radio reported. Researchers studied forests on four Native American reservations.

The tribal forests have been able to retain almost all of their plant diversity from 50 years ago, said Don Waller, a study author and professor of botany and environmental studies at UW-Madison.

The lower population of whitetail deer on reservations may contribute to the diversity, Waller said. Tribal forests had 25 to 50 percent fewer deer per acre than other forests, the study found. An overabundance of deer on non-reservation land seems to curtail growth and diversity, he said.

“They’ve decimated the understory, cover and diversity in many areas, including those state parks that banned hunting for many years,” Waller said.

Tribes typically harvest deer at higher rates, said Jonathan Gilbert, director of the Biological Services Division with the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission.

“It’s their cultural regulations that permit this. Tribal members are out

harvesting deer for food primarily,” Gilbert said. “They want to be able to do that during a broad range of times so not only during nine days in November.”

The study indicated that changes in deer and forestry management can help forests flourish, Waller said.

“We can learn that if we harvest deer in a different way and if we harvest forests in a different way, we can better retain plant diversity. We can ensure higher tree regeneration,” Waller said. “We can store and sequester more carbon and biomass in our forests, addressing some of the greenhouse gas problem that we face.”

Skenandore takes the helm for Lady Thunderhawks softball

The Oneida Lady Thunderhawks softball team has a new shot caller for the weather-shortened 2017 season. First year Head Coach Brad Skenandore takes over for Muriel King who remains with the team in an assistant coaching capacity along with Kathy Doxtater.

With this spring's weather wreaking havoc on prep sports schedules all over northeast Wisconsin, Skenandore won't have as much time as he'd like to evaluate his team's game talent but he's excited for the opportunity to kick off his coaching career. "This is my first head coaching job at any level," Skenandore said. "I've assisted a couple of Little League teams over the years and I know some of these girls from last year's summer program in Green Bay. Some of them convinced me to try for the position so I went for it and it worked out.

"We started practicing in mid-March and we've been going six days a week, including Sundays, with two-hour practices," Skenandore said. "We were supposed to hit the mid-season mark last week but with all the snowfall we've had we have only been able to get outside for one week. So we've been trying to adjust as best we can and

roll with the punches."

With his roster of 13 players Skenandore is still in the process of evaluating which players will play what positions on the diamond. "We're going to have everybody play as much as we can and see how the season goes," Skenandore said. "The girls are all open to playing wherever we put them so they truly are good overall team players."

"I've pretty much been playing second base the majority of the season," Natavia Adams, a freshman infielder, said. "I think we're doing pretty good so far. I can't guarantee a win every game but I think with the way our practices have been going, our motivation, and all the hard work we've been putting in I think we're going to do pretty well."

"I've been playing all over the infield," Junior Mercedes Ackley said. "I think we're going to keep improving as the season goes on. If any of your girls are into softball please let them play when they're young so we can keep this program going."

Junior Tiara Barber has spent a significant amount of time on the pitcher's mound for the Lady T-Hawks. "I've been pitching a lot and playing shortstop as well," Barber said. "I think we're going to keep improving as the season goes on because we're communicating more. Earlier on we weren't really talking to each other out there be-

cause we were nervous but once we got going things started to get better. As far as rivals go I really want to defeat Gillett this season because I've just always felt a higher level of competitiveness with them."

The truncated schedule for the Lady Thunderhawks now means they will play a seven game season instead of the usual 11. "One of the benefits of the shortened season is the fact that five of our remaining six games will be played right here at home," Skenandore said. "So if we can win out here at home we have a pretty good shot at taking the M&O Conference."

Skenandore has some very attainable expectations for the remainder of the season. "This is a program that just got restarted a few years ago," Skenandore said. "So the biggest thing I really want to see is improvement. The experience level of these girls ranges from those who have played since they were seven to some who have never touched a bat or ball. Since we don't have a feeder program some of these players are learning the fundamentals from the ground up.

"It's amazing how hard these girls work," Skenandore said. "From my experiences as an assistant coach in the past this is easily one of the hardest working groups I've ever seen. I fully anticipate steady, overall improvement which we can all be proud of."

12th Annual Youth Day on the Farm April 12

The Oneida Nation Farm recently hosted its annual Youth Day on April 12, inviting the sixth graders from the Oneida Nation Middle School to learn about where their food comes from, their own agricultural heritage and the opportunities for careers in the industry. The intent of this event is to fully engage the next generation into agriculture and a healthy lifestyle, using educational and interactive hands-on learning opportunities.

A strong proponent for agriculture education is the Oneida Nation Farm Manager, Jeff Scofield who sees great value in initiating this connection.

“This is a great opportunity for them to really see what agriculture has to offer,” he says.

Their day on the farm began with a visit to a local family owned dairy farm. From there they went to the Oneida Nation beef operation. Here, they learned how crops are planted and cattle are raised, including hearing from guest speakers like a local veterinarian who gave them an opportunity to see how an ultrasound works. Students even had a chance to practice their veterinary skills by injecting an orange with colored water – subcutaneous (just under the peel) and intramuscular (into the fruit). After a lunch

of bison sloppy joes and other locally made foods, the group went to the Oneida Buffalo Overlook to see the herd and then a tour of the apple orchard.

This was the 12th year that the Oneida Nation Farm has hosted the Youth Day on the Farm event. 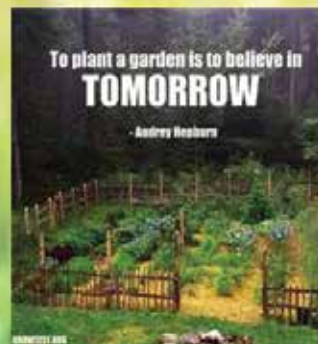
